
The target threshold for success is a six-year (150% of expected time to graduation) of at least 60%. CIU has successfully achieved this threshold for eight of the past ten years.

Did you know? In the 2017-18 Academic Year, the US Department of Education began to include the disaggregation of financial aid information in the IPEDS Outcomes Survey. As a measure of student success for low-income students, higher ed institutions must report the 4-year, 6-year, and 8-year graduations rates for Pell recipients. Figure 5-2 6-Year Graduation Rate Comparison by Pell and Non-Pell Recipients







Figure 5-3 2012-13 Cohort Six-Year Graduation Rates by Pell and Non-Pell Recipients As Compared to National and State Data



National and State Data Comparison: CIU continues to match or exceed both the national and state graduation rates for all students and Pell recipients. Nationally, the non-profit, private colleges and universities reported a 6-year graduation rate of **72%** for all students in the 2012 Cohort. The 6-year rate for Pell students reported by the non-profit, private sector was **52%**. These rates compare to CIU's rates of **71%** and **61%** respectively.
